Exciting 2023 at Hueytown Church!

"In the Beginning GOD 'ELHOIM' Created"

Twelve months have passed, and now we come to the House of the Lord on the first day of the week and the first day of the year 2023! Glory be to the one and only True God. (Isaiah 45:5-12). We have just completed a vigorous class curriculum where the church studied the books of Exodus and Acts.

The exodus began in pain and ended in liberation. At the time of the Exodus, an estimated 3-4 million people left Egypt, and only 2 of the original made it to the Promised Land. While it took God one night to get the people out of Egypt, it took 40 years to get Egypt out of Israel. And, as Paul would later say, these things happened to them for our instruction and example so that we would avoid making the same mistakes they did. (1 Corinthians 10:6-13)

Acts picked up where Jesus left off or up, literally. As the Lord ascended to heaven, the apostles waited for the Holy Spirit to descend, and the church was established in Acts 2. It was a glorious day as the prophecies of Moses, the prophets, and the Psalms had been fulfilled - Jesus was born of a virgin, rejected by Israel, crucified on the cross, resurrected from the dead on the third day, and sat at the right hand of God. (Acts 26:12-23). Finally, Paul was sent to prison in Rome, where he wrote his prison epistles.

This year we will pick up where Exodus and Acts left off - Selected Psalms, Prison Epistles, and Apologetics.

In Exodus, God demanded that His children and the rest of the world

recognize and respect Him as the true God. This required faith and obedience from the heart and not simply going through some ritualistic motion of religiosity but true worship. The Selected Psalms dovetail perfectly because of the hymnbook:

- **Brings us Joy** the Psalms are joyous, triumphant songs of praise.
- Asking the critical questions The Why of Wisdom In the Psalms, we find answers to questions like Who am I? Why am I here? (Psalm 8) Is my life valuable? (Psalm 139) Why do good things happen to bad people? (Psalm 73) How can I be happy? (Psalm 1)
- It shows us how to worship
- Shows God's magnitude and power
- Meets us where we are The Psalms put into words our pain, disappointment, and depression.
- Psalms Show Every Season of Life

While in prison, Paul wrote a series of letters: **Ephesians**, **Philippians**, **Colossians**, and **Philemon**. We were somehow introduced to these churches and cities in the book of Acts. These letters encapsulate Paul's emotions, love, and passion for Christ, the church, and the lost world. It seems that one can conclude that Paul figured out that the greatest sacrifice was not dying for Christ but living for Him - dying for Christ

Reminded to Remember

It seems incredible. The greatest coming event in the history of the world, and the last great promise by Almighty God, and we have to be reminded to remember it and prepare for it! But the sad fact is that we often forget Jesus is coming again. Every sin I commit and every good deed about which I procrastinate is only a reminder that I have temporarily slumbered from my watchfulness.

When the disciples were troubled about the future of Jerusalem, the Lord gave them sure signs to watch for to know when the destruction was coming. Using this catastrophic judgment as His introduction, Jesus then spoke of a far greater judgment concerning all of mankind. This final judgment would have no telltale signs of its happening, for it would be swift and sudden. (Matthew 25:42-44). This illustration must have left a deep impression on Peter, John, and Paul because they emphasized it with force in their writings to their brethren (2 Peter 3:10; 1 Thessalonians 5:2; Revelation 3:3; 16:15).

God has given us His Word and His Plan so that we can plan for the eternal future. Failure to plan will be our fault. Many are living as if there is no eternity either in hell or heaven.

Plan Purposefully: I hereby propose to myself and God to plan my life around one goal: heaven! This plan is clearly focused in the following Scriptures, which I will read daily: Philippians 3:7-11, 20-21; Colossians 3:1-4; Titus 3:11-13; 2 Peter 3:1-14.

Prepare Prayerfully: The best-laid plans will soon become lifeless without Jesus' warning to "watch and pray." Therefore, while watching and working, I will fervently pray. These Scriptures, read daily, will remind me to "watch and pray": Mark 13:32–37; Ephesians 6:10–18; 2 Thessalonians 1:7–12; 1 Peter 4:7.

Proceed Positively: No plan can succeed without confidence in its success. I will therefore develop a positive attitude as I proceed in my quest for heaven. These Scriptures will train my conscience to think in this way: 2 Corinthians 5:1–9; Philippians 4:13; 2 Timothy 1:12; 4:7–8; 1 Peter 1:3–5; 1 John 2:28.

Pursue Persistently: "On the plains of hesitation lie the blackened bones of countless millions, who, at the dawn of victory, sat down to rest, and resting—died!" Therefore, I am determined to pursue my goal with steadfast persistence until victory is won when my Lord comes to take me home. These Scriptures will give faith and courage to press on - 1 Corinthians 15:51–58; Philippians 3:12–14; 1 Timothy 6:12, 14; James 4:7–8; 1 Peter 1:3–9, 13.

My burning desire for us all is to rise triumphantly together into the air forever to be with our Father, our Savior, the Spirit, the angelic host, and all the redeemed. Watch and Pray!
